What is Pupil Premium Funding?

The Pupil Premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers.

Pupil premium funding is available to:

- local authority maintained schools, including special schools and pupil referral units
- voluntary-sector, with local authority agreement
- special schools not maintained by the local authority (NMSS) academies and free schools, including special and AP academies¹

Overview of School Pupil Premium 18-19

Financial year 2018 to 2019

In the 2018 to 2019 financial year, schools will receive the following funding for each child registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years:

- £1,320 for pupils in reception year to year 6
- £935 for pupils in year 7 to year 11

If a child has a parent who works for the Armed Services the school will receive £300 funding each.

Schools will also receive £2,300 for each pupil who has left local-authority care because of 1 of the following:

- adoption
- a special guardianship order
- a child arrangements order
- a residence order

If a pupil has been registered as eligible for free school meals and has also left local-authority care for any of the reasons above, they will attract the £2,300 rate.

Children who have been in local-authority care for 1 day or more also attract £2,300 of pupil premium funding. Funding for these pupils doesn't go to their school; it goes to the [virtual school head \(VSH\)](#) in the local authority that looks after the child. [VSHs are responsible for managing pupil premium funding for looked-after children.](#)²

Planned Spending for 18-19 Academic Year

The Pupil Premium for this academic year is planned to be spent in four main target areas. These include the primary area of Attainment and Progress but also the subsidiary areas including Parental Support, Engagement, Pupil Resilience, Opportunities and Enrichment. Subsidiary area spending is designed to directly support long term progress and academic achievement for those in receipt of Pupil Premium.



Objectives – What we aim to achieve:

1. Improving Attainment and Progress

It is our aim that by the end of the academic year 2018-19:

- The attainment gap between pupils in receipt of PPG and other pupils is no larger than 10% in reading, writing and maths in all year groups
- The attainment gap between pupils in receipt of PPG and other pupils in reading and writing in year 6 is closing rapidly
- The attainment gap between pupils in receipt of PPG and other pupils in reading, writing & maths in year 4 is closing rapidly

2. Parental Support and Engagement

It is our aim that all parents of children in receipt of pupil premium are fully engaged with the school and are supporting their child's learning by:

- Attending parent consultations and homework morning events
- Actively supporting their child at home with home learning activities and reading support
- Ensuring their child has good attendance of 96% or above where possible
- Ensuring their child is equipped for school (providing appropriate uniform and PE kit)

3. Improving Pupil Learning Knowledge and Resilience

It is our aim that pupils in receipt of pupil premium will improve their:

- Ability to talk with confidence about their learning and next steps
- Engagement with teacher feedback
- Learning resilience and perseverance
- Aspirations for their future

4. Opportunities and Enrichment

All pupils in receipt of premium will be provided with wider opportunities for social, emotional and cultural development through funded access to enrichment opportunities. It is our aim that through these opportunities pupils in receipt of pupil premium will improve their:

- Self-confidence and self-view
- Social and team working skills
- Independence and problem solving skills
- Experience of the wider world

Barriers To Learning - Potential effects on pupil progress:

Low attainment on entry to school due to learning difficulties and/or SEMH needs

Lack of resilience /social, emotional and mental health issues / attachment issues experienced by some PP children often inhibit access to learning.

High levels of school mobility

Family challenges

Significant Special Educational Needs

Parental support with home learning

Actions and Provision for 2018-19:
